Was it a war justified by “manifest destiny” and Mexican transgressions or was it essentially a land grab? This course explores the causes, the battles, and the aftermath of the Mexican War.

A Willow Tree Becomes a Forest

The resilience and commitment of those Chinese individuals who persevered in their dream of becoming American serve as a testament to their tenacity and faith in a brighter future. This narrative celebrates diversity, inclusion, and the immigrant American spirit, which collectively contribute to our nation's rich tapestry.

An Insider's Guide to Visiting Grand Canyon National Park

Native American Removals in Twentieth Century San Diego

As you drive, bike, or hike around San Diego County, did you ever wonder how that valley came to be a resort or what existed before that lake? In this class we will discover two not so well-known places that exist for our enjoyment because Native people were forcibly removed. The Warner Hot Springs Resort in Northern San Diego County was home to the Kupa people for thousands of years. And then it wasn't. Today's El Capitan Reservoir is great for fishing, boating, and kayaking. All at the expense of the Ipai people who were "relocated."

How Disneyland Imagineers Brought 3-D Animals and People to Life

The most popular attractions at Disneyland and the other theme parks are greatly enhanced by the robotic animals and people who help to convey the story as guests pass by. The Haunted Mansion, Pirates of the Caribbean, and Walt Disney's Enchanted Tiki Room are some examples that use the technology called Audio-Animatronics. The concept began earlier than many suppose and this presentation focuses on the evolution through the first fifteen years of Disneyland (1955-1970). **Note:** The instructor for this course will be remote, students will choose to attend online or in-person.

What the Supreme Court Decided: Behind This Term's Biggest Rulings

By July, the Supreme Court will have decided many consequential cases affecting individual rights (including free speech and freedom from discrimination and official misconduct), environmental regulation, and the powers of federal and state governments. Going deeper than the headlines and punditry, you will better understand the importance and context of some of the most consequential decisions. You will see how the key cases confronted the justices with difficult tradeoffs. And you will be able to form your own opinion about how well they reconciled the key considerations. You'll have a current context for understanding calls for Supreme Court reform.

Behind Those Baby Blues: The Films of Paul Newman

Paul Newman, the embodiment of charisma, captivated movie audiences with his iconic baby blue eyes, striking features, and powerful screen presence. Known for his multiple Academy Award-nominated performances in films like *Cat on a Hot Tin Roof* (1958), *The Hustler* (1961), and *Absence of Malice* (1981), Newman ultimately won an Oscar for *The Color of Money* (1986), the sequel to *The Hustler*. Alongside his acting career, he pursued a parallel path as a race car driver and dedicated significant time to entrepreneurial and philanthropic endeavors. This course will trace the timeline of Newman's remarkable career, from his legendary collaborations with Robert Redford in *Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid* (1969) and *The Sting* (1973) to his final roles in *Road to Perdition* (2002), *Empire Falls* (2005), and *Cars* (2006), where he voiced the retired race car Doc Hudson.

Demystifying Energy Security

Energy is essential for both national and economic security, underpinning all aspects of life. Yet discussions of energy security often exclude the public, reducing complex issues to simplistic narratives like "Green is Good" or "Oil is Evil," which provide little actionable insight. In this course, you will engage in a comprehensive examination of energy's role in human development. Topics include the unmatched importance of hydrocarbons (oil and more); advancements in electricity, the past, present, and future of nuclear energy; and the potential of renewables. We will explore how these energy sources impact national security, economic stability, industrial production, transportation, and daily life. Join this course for a balanced, realistic assessment of energy security, a critical issue of our time.

Enjoying the Past and Present New York City: A History of Recreation in the Big Apple

Through readings and case studies, we will gain insight into the life-course approach to public health, emphasizing the importance of early intervention, continuous care, and aging with dignity.

Potential topics include climate change, healthcare economics, economic inequality, and more, with final selections based on the most relevant and timely issues at the start of the course.

This course explores a myriad of structures set against the backdrop of the societies in which they existed, the construction methods used, the patrons for whom these structures were constructed, and the notions of the builders and architects who created them.

100 Years of Magic: The Disney Legacy and Influence

Throughout the course, we will consider diverse perspectives—from those who revere the Magic Kingdom to those who critique it and everywhere in between. This course offers a comprehensive look at how Walt Disney's vision became a cultural force shaping today's entertainment industry.
